# Who Do You Say He Is?

Greetings Friends,

I was meditating in my office this morning on a book called *The Case for Christ* by Lee Strobel. The premise of the book is how Lee Strobel, an investigative reporter and atheist, set out to examine the evidence for Christianity. For two years, he interviewed various scholars and experts in the field of archeology, theology, and philosophy. He studied ancient manuscripts, analyzed history, and asked poignant questions about the existence of Christ as the Son of Man. But more importantly, he made the case that Christ was truly divine, not just a good moral teacher or prophet.

Listen to how C. S. Lewis in his book *Mere Christianity* argued how Jesus was more than a great moral teacher: "A man who was merely a man and said the sort of things Jesus said would not be a great moral teacher. He would either be a lunatic — on the level with the man who says he is a poached egg — or else he would be the Devil of Hell. You must make your choice. Either this man was, and is, the Son of God, or else a madman or something worse. You can shut him up for a fool, you can spit at him and kill him as a demon or you can fall at his feet and call him Lord and God, but let us not come with any


patronizing nonsense about him being a great human teacher. He has not left that open to us. He did not intend to."

Lewis was so right. I would stake my life on Jesus as my Lord and God. We can look at Him as a fool and a madman, or worship Jesus as our Lord and God, but the argument is settled for me. The countless miracles that Christ performed, the more than 500 witnesses who saw Him after He was resurrected from the dead, and roughly 24,000 manuscripts from the New Testament alone is a truth to which I'm willing to roll the dice.

When Jesus visited Caesarea Philippi, he had a riveting conversation with His disciples about who people say is the Son of Man. The disciples replied, "Some say John the Baptist; others say Elijah; and still others, Jeremiah or one of the prophets." Then Jesus asked Peter the same question, "Who do you say I am?"

Peter emphatically answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:13-16). The apostles suffered a martyr's death because of their belief in who Christ was, and they followed Him to the end.

How about you? If you believe in Christ, are you willing to follow Him to the end? Do you come to the Lord expecting something tangible in return? Do you reason that if you believe, then your lives will be filled with wealth, health, and physical comfort? Do you think that positive statements about your goals will translate into a life of spiritual wellbeing? Do you go to church to find only comfort for yourself? Is your faith simply a formula



for living well in the here and now? Are you seeking personal improvement in your current situations?

If the answer to those questions is yes, then you may be believing in a prosperity gospel. The Prosperity Gospel movement goes back decades to the middle of the 20th century. As television use increased during the latter half of the century, so did the number of televangelists, who promoted this theology. Giving was promoted as a means of achieving financial success and health and well-being. Churches that were based on this theology soon began to swell in their membership and attendance. Why wouldn't they? People were searching for stability, calm, peace of mind, even comfort.

However, for those who do not lean in the direction of the Prosperity Gospel, there is a different pathway for following Jesus. That pathway is called the Gospel. In Luke 14:27, 33 we read the following: "Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple." And "So therefore, none of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions."

Jesus called upon those who would be his disciples to give themselves completely for his sake. When they argued about who would be the greatest, He reminded them that the first would be last and the last first. When they worried about things, He reminded them that God was with them regardless of circumstances.

There was never a promise of health, wealth, and good fortune in return for discipleship. Indeed, discipleship was not about the disciple or the disciple's wellbeing. To the contrary, discipleship is about Christ. Worshiping the Lord is not about coming to church to get a feel-good message, so WE can be comforted! It is about worshiping so that we will be able to carry the Good News out into the

# Feathered Gifts from God

I had a pleasant surprise on New Year's Eve morning. After sitting down at our computer by a window I saw a sprightly Carolina chickadee and an attractive tufted titmouse perched in a bare lilac bush, right outside the window, only six feet from me! I admired the beauty of those little "cousins." The chickadee was gray, with a black bib and a black cap set jauntily on its forehead. The titmouse was also gray, but with peach-colored flanks, a gray crest, and big, black eyes that were quite appealing. I continued to watch those handsome birds pecking at the lilac twigs for a minute, possibly for insect eggs, then fly

away.

Less than a minute later, a striking male northern cardinal on the same bush caught my eye. Within seconds, he flew to a neighboring, young American holly tree. I was impressed by his bright plumage among the green foliage of the holly. I was reminded of a Christmas tree. After a few seconds of showing off his colorful plumage, that male cardinal flew off, leaving me feeling lucky to see such beauty so close.

As I continued working, I thought about that attractive line of shrubs along the side of our house, that small, neighborhood birds use as a sheltering roadway to the feeders in our backyard. Two lilacs had green leaf

buds at the time. The holly had deep green foliage, and a red twigged dogwood had red stems. These shrubs and the birds that flutter among them enhance the attractiveness of each other. A few minutes after I spotted the cardinal, another motion on the lilac caught my attention — it was a handsome, male white-throated sparrow. His back, tail, and wings were brown with dark streaks. He sported a vivid black and white striped crown and a white throat patch.

While admiring the close-up sparrow, I noticed a Carolina wren touching down briefly in the holly. That lovely wren had warm brown feathering and its tail was cocked upright, reflecting its sassy personality. It hopped about in the holly a few seconds, then dropped to the ground and promptly disappeared because of its camouflaging feathering.

We have had these pretty kinds of birds – and other species – on our suburban lawn for years. I have seen these birds, and others, in that line of shrubbery for years, but not so many at once and so close. I was impressed! As always, beauty is where you find it, sometimes right at home! We do not know when and where nature will enhance our lives with its beauties and intrigues. That day, I was happy to experience those lovely, feathered gifts from God.
